30 **Agenda Item 1: Call to Order/Roll Call/Establishment of a Quorum**

31  
32 Chairperson Cervantes called the Committee meeting to order at 10:00 a.m., roll was  
33 called, and a quorum established.

34  
35 **Agenda Item 2: Chairperson’s Welcome and Opening Remarks**

36  
37 Ms. Cervantes read the opening remarks and welcomed all participants to the meeting.

38  
39 **Agenda Item 3: Public Comment for Items Not on the Agenda.**

40  
41 There was no public comment offered.

42  
43 **Agenda Item 4: COVID-19 Waiver Update**

44

45 Ms. Sorrick provided this update, which was included in the meeting materials. She  
46 provided an update of two waivers that were set to expire on March 31, 2022: the  
47 reinstatement of the canceled or inactive license, and the face-to-face supervision  
48 requirement. The face-to-face supervision requirement was set to renew on April 1,  
49 2022, for six months. Ms. Sorrick also stated there were a couple of waivers that were  
50 contingent upon the declared emergency still being in effect.

51  
52 There was no further Committee comment offered.

53  
54 Dr. Vinny commented asking the question of why remote supervision is not permanent.

55  
56 Ms. Sorrick clarified that the authority for that waiver is under the declared emergency  
57 so that remote supervision will be in place if the declared emergency stands. She also  
58 specified that there are regulatory and legislative proposals that would continue what is  
59 in practice with the waiver.

60  
61 Dr. Phillips also clarified that the Board does not have the authority to implement remote  
62 supervision permanently until there is a statute or regulation in place, but that he sees  
63 the value of remote supervision.

81 1. SB 401 (Pan) Healing arts: psychology - Amendments to sections 2960 and 2960.1  
82 of the Business and Professions Code Regarding Denial, Suspension and  
83 Revocation for Acts of Sexual Contact

85 Ms. Cervantes introduced this item.

86  
87 Ms. Costa provided a summary and update on SB 401 (Pan). She stated the Board  
88 submitted technical amendments to the author's office and that the bill would be heard  
89 later in the legislative year. This was provided as information only with no action  
90 required.

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b) Bills with Active Positions Taken by the Board

1. AB 32 (Aguiar-Curry) Telehealth

Ms. Costa provided a summary and update on AB 32 (Aguiar-Curry). She stated that the bill had been sent to the Senate and was in the Health Committee waiting for a hearing date.

There was no Committee or public comment offered.

2. SB 731 (Durazo) Criminal records: relief

Ms. Costa provided a summary and update on SB 731 (Durazo). She stated that the bill had failed passage in September 2021 on the Assembly Floor and was available for reconsideration, but a vote had not been taken yet.

There was no Committee or public comment offered.

3. SB 772 (Ochoa Bogh) Professions and vocations: citations: minor violations

Ms. Costa provided a summary and update on SB 772 and stated that the bill is not moving forward in 2022.

138 Ms. Cervantes introduced this item and asked members if they would like to discuss  
139 individual bills, since this item was provided as information only with no action required.

141 Dr. Phillips asked Ms. Costa a clarifying question about how bills can die in the  
142 Legislature.  
143

144 Ms. Costa explained that when a bill does not meet legislative deadlines, the bill cannot  
145 move forward in that bill number. She explained that every even year in a legislative  
146 session, a bill needs to get passed out of its House of Origin (Assembly or Senate, based  
147 on where it was introduced), and that deadline is often the last day of January. She also  
148 explained that legislators can reintroduce the same bill text into new bill numbers.  
149

150 There was no public comment offered.

155 d) Review of Bills for Active Position Recommendations to the Board

157 1. AB 1662 (Gipson) Licensing boards: disqualification from licensure: criminal  
158 conviction  
159

160 Ms. Costa provided a summary of this bill proposal.  
161

162 Dr. Cervantes asked if this bill would open the Board up to litigation. Discussion ensued  
163 between Ms. Sorrick, Ms. Bon, Mr. Glasspiegel, and Dr. Phillips on this question.  
164

165 Dr. Cervantes suggested having a study session on these types of bills in the future.  
166

167 Dr. Casuga commented that she appreciated Ms. Sorrick's explanation of the concerns  
168 that Board staff had. She explained that the lack of specificity in the bill was more  
169 concerning than its fiscal impact.  
170

171 Dr. Laura Lee commented that within internships they want to look at the issues  
172 surrounding criminal backgrounds and want to be able to make a decision not to accept  
173 someone into an internship.  
174

175 It was M(Casuga)/S(Phillips)/C to approve the staff recommendation to recommend the  
176 Board take an "Oppose" position on AB 1662 (Gipson).

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180 2. AB 1733 (Quirk) State bodies: open meetings  
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182 Ms. Costa provided a summary of this bill proposal.

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There was no Committee or public comment offered.

It was M(Phillips)/S(Casuga)/C approve the staff recommendation to recommend the Board take a “Support if Amended” position on AB 1733 (Quirk).

### 3. AB 2123 (Villapudua) Bringing Health Care into Communities Act of 2023

Ms. Costa provided a summary of this bill proposal.

Dr. Casuga asked that as a Board member and licensee of the Board who could be potentially eligible for the mortgage assistance provided in the bill if she should abstain from voting on this measure.

Ms. Bon stated that she was not seeing concerns on this issue because the Legislature would still have to pass the bill. Dr. Phillips further explained that it was his understanding that if the law generally benefited all licensees equally, there wouldn't be a need to recuse oneself.

No public comment was offered.

It was M(Phillips)/S(Casuga)/C to approve the staff recommendation to recommend the Board take a “Support if Amended” position on AB 2123 (Villapudua).

Vote: 3 Ayes, (Cervantes, Casuga, Phillips), 0 Noes

### 4. AB 2754 (Bauer-Kahan) Psychology: supervising psychologists: qualifications

Ms. Costa provided a summary of this bill proposal.

Colin Sueyres of the California Psychological Association commented that this was their sponsored bill, and that they have seen the efficacy of the policy as implemented through the Governor's Executive Order.

Dr. Phillips asked if regulations would need to be promulgated if the bill becomes effective immediately per the Board staff's recommended amendments.

Ms. Costa clarified that if the bill became effective immediately upon signature by the Governor the Board would not have to promulgate any regulations for this bill to take effect.

It was M(Casuga)/S(Phillips)/C to approve the staff recommendation to recommend the Board take a “Support if Amended” position on AB 2754 (Bauer-Kahan).

235 Dr. Phillips commented that this bill seemed like a concept rather than a defined process,  
236 which would make it difficult to evaluate whether this would be a useful addition to  
237 procedures. He also noted the costs associated with the bill.

239 It was M(Phillips)/S(Casuga)/C to approve the staff recommendation to recommend the  
240 Board take an "Oppose" position on SB 1365 (Jones).

246 Ms. Costa provided a summary of this bill proposal.

247

248 Colin Sueyres of the California Psychological Association commented to thank the  
249 members for the motion on SB 1428. He stated that there is a need for this measure for  
250 psychologists to expand their ability to provide service.

251

252 Dr. Phillips asked Mr. Sueyres if the California Psychological Association was amenable  
253 to the Board's proposed amendments and Mr. Sueyres confirmed the Association was  
254 favorable to the amendments.

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256 It was M(Casuga)/S(Phillips)/C to approve the staff recommendation to recommend the  
257 Board take a "Support if Amended" position on SB 1428 (Archuleta).

391 Development regulatory package.

394 Development regulatory package..
